RUSTIC ROSTER AND NEXT-OF-KIN ROSTER TO ARRIVE SOON. Our annual updated Rustic Roster and Next-of-Kin Roster will be sent to you via email within the next few days.

HURLBURT FIELD AIR PARK BEING RENOVATED. Hurlburt's beautiful air park is being expanded and reconfigured so the public can visit the Air Park in the future without having to formally enter the base. This will make the air park much more user-friendly. The front gate is being relocated northward and a number of aircraft will be relocated southward within the expanded air park. Public parking will also be added. In Phase One of the reconstruction project, the FAC aircraft on display and the FAC Memorial will remain where they are currently located and will not be in the public's viewing area. They will eventually be moved into the expanded air park and configured similar to their current layout. The final phase of the project will be to build a Special Operations Heritage Center within the Air Park. Local FACs are birddogging this reconfiguration project, and the base leadership has been very attentive to our inputs and recommendations.

FRENCH INTEPRETER PIERRE 'PETE" LAVOIE—SECOND YOUNGEST RUSTIC? It looks like Leon Cardiff may still be our youngest Rustic. Leon was born on April 30, 1951. Pete Lavoie may be our second youngest Rustic. He was born about seven months earlier on September 29, 1950, which makes Pete 73 years young. Both served as Rustic Alpha radio operators on Nui Ba Den Mountain. (Anyone any younger than Leon?)

Here's a bit of Pete's history. He was raised in Grand Isle, a small town in northern Maine. French was his first language. He was in Okinawa when he was recruited to be a French-speaking interpreter for the Rustic, Tilly, and Sundog FACs.

Pete arrived at Bien Hoa in 1971 and flew only a few missions with the Rustics. His first mission was in the OV-10 with the "Silver Fox", **Captain Arnie Sims.** Arnie was known for making his backseaters fly the aircraft on their very first mission. Pete was apprehensive, but said he didn't have to make the takeoff, as he feared. He did have to do an aileron roll on their return home flight leg, which he said was a scary enough for a rookie aviator.

After about a month, Pete was transferred to Bien Thuy for about a month and flew in the 0-2 aircraft. He said he does not recall either his Rustic or Tilly callsign. He finally wound up at Than Son Nut Air Base until late November, flying with the Sundog FACs as Sundog "Charlie".

After his Southeast Asia tour ended, Pete was posted to Eglin AFB, FL. He was still only a three-striper then when he was called out for a Wing awards ceremony which included mostly officers. During the awards ceremony he was awarded a DFC and several air medals for his distinguished service as a combat interpreter in Vietnam. That really turned heads and got everyone's attention.

After separating from the Air Force, Pete worked 23 years for Boeing Aircraft as a technician and Customer Service Representative, of which 20 years were spent overseas. His first assignment was 3 years in Paris, followed by an assignment in Madagascar, then 6 years in Casablanca, and 7 years in China. He retired in 2009 and now resides in Rancho, New Mexico with his wife Nadia.

They will digitize photos and videos and return them (or you can tell them to keep them and just send you the digitized material.)

**2.** Khmer Nickname for the OV-10. Did you know some of the Cambodian allies had a nickname for the OV-10? According to Hotel KPC, Lawn Lima Young, the OV-10 was often referred to as "Chan Srak" because its tail resembled the "handle" of the Chan Srak stacked bowls which are common in Cambodia.

#### 3. Rocket Pods Arrive at Hurlburt Field

**Sgt Ryan Gladu** at Hurlburt Field drove to Moody AFB, GA in July and picked up 14 rocket pods which were declared excess and no longer operational.by the A-10's 23rd Fighter Wing. We have been looking for rocket pods for our FAC aircraft on display for quite a few years and finally found them at Moody AFB during our March 2023 Rustic reunion. Our thanks go to the Hurlburt personnel who moved quickly to obtain these much sought-after pods which will be restored and mounted on the OV-10, A-37, and A-26A aircraft.



# WOULD YOU LIKE TO HAVE YOUR HISTORY RECORDED? Dr. Kelly Crager, Texas Tech Univ., Vietnam Archives Project, explains how you can be interviewed and what's involved.

I don't really work from a set list of questions, just kind of start at the beginning and see where the interview takes us. We do full-life interviews, beginning with early life, family, growing up, school, etc., and then we get into your time in the military. We start with various levels of training, types of airplanes flown and preparing to go to Southeast Asia. We will spend the bulk of the interview discussing your Vietnam experiences, combat, important missions, but also daily life, people you remember, specific events, and the like.

Once we have exhausted the in-country topics we will discuss life after the war, your career, family, etc., before wrapping up with a few questions about your experiences, your thoughts on the war, it's influences on you. So, it can be a pretty lengthy and involved interview, but certainly worth the effort. Most interviews last between 3 and 6 hours, some more, some less.

I conduct interviews over the phone or via Zoom and keep sessions to 1 ½ to 2 hours, holding multiple sessions as necessary. Once the interview is complete, I will post the interview audio online at www.vietnam.ttu.edu. I encourage you to visit our website and take a look at the work we do preserving the history of the Vietnam War.

No preparation is necessary for an interview. I ask questions about your life, and you answer in as much or as little detail as you like. Some veterans prefer to dust off their logbooks, letters home, photos, etc., to remind them of different things and I certainly encourage them to do so. But it is certainly not a requirement.

GEORGE LARSON'S (RUSTIC "U") INTERVIEW TRANSCRIPT TO BE DIGITIZED AND MADE AVAILABLE. Chuck Manuel (Rustic Interpreter) recently went through some storage boxes and discovered a 34-page transcript of an interview of SSgt George Larson by Capt. Clinton Murphy (Interpreter OIC) in July 1971. The transcript contains quite a few astute observations about the Rustic mission, the important role of our interpreters, and what makes a good interpreter. I think you'll be impressed with George's knack for discerning enemy movements and his ability to give detailed intel reports after every mission. A number of the pilots who George flew with are named. He also mentions the accounts of several Rustic shootdowns, and some key troops-in-contact missions that he supported---most notably, the Battle for Prey Totung.

SUNRISE MINISTRY REPORT FROM KOMPONG CHAM, CAMBODIA. Susan Smith, Nov 2023. News flash from the Cambodian government! Pink eye is everywhere, wash your hands. The Kampong Cham

prison officials have asked Sunrise to deal with this threat, which has infected about 1 in 6 of the prison population. So far, we have distributed 249 bottles of antibiotic eye drops and provided education on the details of prevention and treatment of this illness.

In other news, in the past month we've helped a child get a tooth extraction, helped an adult client see a doctor about swollen legs & blood pressure medication, provided medication to a child with a two-inch diameter ulcer on his leg, bought shoes for a student who was wearing his mother's shoes to school, taught HIV clients about domestic violence, and tutored on subtraction.

# RUSTIC OV-10 TAIL NUMBER 67-14639 DEDICATED "DOWNUNDER." Aussie FAC Ken Semmler provided the following information on 639 in June 2019:

"In 2007 the Australian War Memorial in Canberra obtained OV-10, 67-14639, for restoration and display. They specifically wanted an OV-10 which was flown by Aussie FACs in Vietnam. A number of Aussie's flew 639 at Cu Chi Air Base in III Corps as an Issue FAC in 1970. Several future Rustics (*Nuber, Newland and Freix*) also flew 639 as Issue FACs prior to becoming Rustics. 639 eventually became a Rustic bird flown at both Bien Hoa and Ubon. **Greg Freix** says it was "my" airplane at Bien Hoa and later at Shaw AFB. He flew his last Air Force fini-flight in 639 at Shaw. Many of you may have also flown 639. Check your logbooks. 639 was found in the Philippines when it was obtained by the AWM Museum. The Bronco's wing is now on and the tail booms will be following in a few weeks. The horizontal stabiliser has received its first coat of USAF grey."

Fully restored 639. Isn't she a beauty?! After sixteen years of diligent effort, 639 was formally dedicated in Canberra on 18 Aug 2023. Rustics Dick Green, Roger Dodd and Margaret Hakun attended the dedication and represented the Rustics. Several members of the Bronco Association were also in attendance.

DID YOU FLY OV-10 TAIL NUMBER 67-14639? When the Rustics compiled a history of which Rustics flew 639, the following sent in their mission data confirming they flew this proud warbird: Aitken, Brunelle, Dufresne, Edwards, Engleman, Ernst, R. Dodd, Freix, Hamann, Harshaw, Larson, McClellan, Newland, Nuber, Spencer and Van Dyke. Surely, many more Rustic names should be on this list.

**Roger Hamann**, Rustic Yankee, reported "My very first look...and ride...in an OV-10 was in "639" on Nov. 10, 1971, from Phan Rang AB to Ubon RTAFB with **Maj. Benny Atkins** (Chico 04/Rustic 02)."

Below is Roger's record of his first month's flights as a Rustic He flew his first combat mission on 13 November 1971, four days after arriving at Ubon. Clearly, the Rustic kept him and our other Ubon interpreters busy. In only eighteen days, from 13 Nov to 31 Nov, he flew 13 combat sorties and garnered 60.1 hours of combat flying time. Look closely and many of you will see that you flew with Roger that month.

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RUSTIC ALPHA'S CRITICAL ROLL. The Rustics could not have operated in Cambodia without the critical "Rustic Alpha" radio relay link to 7<sup>th</sup> Air Force on top of Nui Ba Den Mountain. Numerous Rustic radio operators served for short periods of time on Nui Ba Den. That distinguished list includes **Paul Lee, Leon Cardiff, Doug Roberson, Greg Lachon, and Dennis Lizdas.** 

Here's **Paul Lee's** account of his Rustic Alpha duty: I was initially posted to Cu Chi Air Base in April 1970 and worked in support of the 3rd Brigade (Issue 30 callsign). I remember we got a couple of radio op guys in when they closed down the Issue 20 site at Tay Ninh, just below the Black Virgin Mountain. I think that was the 2nd Brigade. Being the new guy and low man on the totem pole I got volunteered to go to the top of the mountain in June for duty at the Rustic Alpha radio relay station supporting Cambodian operations. An interesting 10 days. I actually got a jeep ride from Cu Chi to the MACV compound in downtown Bien Hoa and then rode a Huey to Nui Ba Den.

I was only supposed to be up there a week but choppers were receiving ground fire while trying to land on top of the mountain so it was three days before I could get a chopper back to Cu Chi. We closed down the 3rd Brigade at Cu Chi sometime around Aug/Sep 70, I don't remember exactly


when, and then I went to Division and worked nights on the radio there. Definitely not much going on there except the occasional Shadow mission. We closed down Cu Chi in the Oct/Nov 1970 timeframe, near as I can remember, and I shipped out to Bearcat, with the Thai's, to complete my tour supporting the Rake FACs and all O-2's there.

In 1973 I had orders back to Vietnam to Tan Son Nhut's 3rd Aerospace Rescue & Recovery group as a radio operator. Of course, they were cancelled before I had to go but were quickly followed by orders to RAF Croughton in England for airways operations. By then I had been out of radio operations for two years, so I had no interest in getting back into it. I separated from the Air Force for 18 months and came back in when offered an opening in the computer field and did that until retirement.

The reason there was not much going on for the Issue FACs at Cu Chi in the summer of 1970 was because the two-month Cambodia incursion in May and June 1970 had blunted the enemy's offensive abilities, plus a newly formed outfit (callsign "Rustic" at Bien Hoa AB) was now pinching some of the Issue FAC's OV-10 aircraft for operations over Cambodia. That's when a number of newly arrived Issue FACs (Newland, Nuber, and Freix) decided to volunteer to join the Rustics.

OSHKOSH REPORT. Leon Cardiff, III DASC, Rustic Alpha and Control. I heard a rumor that the final day(s) of Warbirds in Review was coming to an end at Oshkosh. Since I had never attended, a friend convinced me I needed to experience what was there. It was well worth the trip from Maryland as I visited family

and friends on the way. Yes, the Oshkosh Experimental Aircraft Association showcased the latest, fastest and nosiest of aircraft and yet my visit was to see and talk to those who flew the OV-10 Bronco, O-2 Skymaster and the O-1 Birddog FAC missions. It would have been better than great for an OV-10, O-2, O-1, and an A-10 to fly separately and together for posterity.

There were Huey Slicks and Huey Gunships that us Rustic Alpha Radio Operators had as transport up to and off of Nui Ba Den. There was also a C-47 "Puff" gunship on display, as well as some O-2's, and O-1's but not ONE OV-10. It was nice to talk to the non-SEA owners.

There were many highlights but by far the best was the Warbirds in Review presentations by former Kenny FAC, retired Air Force LTC Ed Fairchild, Sneaky Pete—an L-19 Army pilot, and the explanation of Laotian pilots learning to fly the T-28.

As a radio operator at Rustic Alpha, Rustic Control, and at Pawnee Target (III DASC) I experienced the processing time for airstrike approvals or clearances for gunships to expend on a target. And yes, from the bleachers I added during the Q & A the perspective of how long it took for those Airstrike approvals vice today's instant communication capabilities. LTC Ed and I got together for a few minutes and have since talked a few times. I also wish to point out that Scotts Miracle Grow was the sponsor of Warbirds in Review.

I am looking forward to attending the Rustic 2025 reunion in Ft Walton Beach with those members who supported the Rustic, Sundog, Tilly or other FAC missions. Pawnee Target out.

RUSTIC ROGER HAMANN ATTENDS JOE GARAND'S MEMORIAL Our thanks go to Roger and Joan Hamann who flew to Maine to attend Joe Garand's memorial service. Joe served as Rustic Echo (French Interpreter) at Bien Hoa Air Base, Vietnam and Ubon RTAFB, Thailand from August 1971 to May 1972. Joe took his final flight on Oct 20, 2023.

### From Robert Clifford, Rustic 03



We flew out on Thursday, 14 September, spent two nights in a great hotel, and returned Saturday evening. When our plane arrived at the airport, we were met by a fire truck which sprayed us. Going thru the concourse, we were met and welcomed by CROWDS of flag waving folks, thanking us... I even got a few kisses! It was hard to hold the tears back.

We were taken to almost all of the memorials plus the White House. Lots of good food and beverages. At the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, we were put in a special position right up near the guard and saw the changing of the guard and a wreath laying. Don't know when I've had such a great experience.
