Two Marine OV-10 Broncos from California provided 18 backseat OV-10 flights on Thursday, and eight 0-1/L-19 Birddogs from throughout the U.S. provided 21 Birddog courtesy flights. Eglin Mission Briefing. While the FAC aircraft practiced in the morning for the next day's Memorial Remembrance Service fly-by, everyone else headed to the Eglin Armament Museum for two briefings and a tour of the museum. After a welcome by the museum's director, **Mr. David Fitzpatrick**, we were provided a fascinating and thorough intel briefing on the current threats that face our nation by Eglin's Chief of Public Affairs, **Mr. Gabe Myers**. After chronicling the threats posed by China, Russia, North Korea, and Iran, he went on to give a detailed briefing on the myriads of Eglin unit's that are working to counter these threats.

One of Eglin's biggest assets is that it is the USAF'S largest base worldwide. It has both land and sea ranges which allow it to carry out significant weapons test and development functions.

Next came a fascinating briefing by Dr. Kelly Crager who explained the significant role Texas Tech Univ.'s Vietnam Archives program is playing in preserving, and most importantly cataloguing, everything having to do with the Southeast Asia War. AFSOC Mission Briefing. Everybody had to get up early Saturday to get to Hurlburt Field's Soundside Club for two briefings. **Maj. Timothy Richard**, Air Force Special Operations Command (AFSOC) Deputy Chief of Staff, gave a detailed briefing on the capabilities of the AFSOC command which now includes both Hurlburt Field and Cannon AFB, New Mexico. Most notably, AFSOC personnel are deployed across the globe.

Special Tactics Training (JTAC) Briefing. MSgt Jose Cruz-Richardson, the superintendent of the Joint Terminal Attack Controllers school, updated us on how the Air Force now controls airstrikes from the ground.

Forward Air Controller Remembrance Service. Clearly, one of the highlights of the entire weekend was the opportunity to remember and honor our FAC brothers who "gave all" while answering their nation's call to duty in Southeast Asia.

The service was attended by several dignitaries include our Florida State District 4 Representative, **Mr. Patt Maney**, and his wife, Caroline. Representing U.S. Congressman, Mr. Matt Gaetz, was his Director of Military Affairs, **Mr. Austin Bury.** The AFSOC Commander, **Lt Gen Michael Conley**, was in attendance, as well as numerous other base senior officers and command chiefs.

The master of ceremony, **Claude Newland**, offered some Hurlburt Reflections and explained that it was the Raven FACs who established the first FAC memorial here at Hurlburt Field's Air Park to honor their 23 fallen brothers. This was in the early 1970s. It was the Raven's small memorial pedestal that made the FAC community come to the realization that it would be an injustice not to properly recognize all of our FAC brothers lost during that fateful period in our nation's history.

The FAC Association's Chaplain, **Col Ret. Dale Hill**, then gave the Memorial address which focused on how FACs were 1. viewed by their peers, 2. how they may be remembered by historians; -- and, finally, 3. how we FACs regard ourselves. **To read the text**, <u>CLICK HERE.</u>



To conclude the Remembrance Service, the Honor Guard came forward to solemnly reposition the memorial flower wreath to the FAC Memorial while being escorted by our two Gold Star family members, Ms. Debbie Harrell and Mr. Gary Smith. As they escorted the Memorial flower wreath, the Emerald Coast Pipes and Drums played "Going Home.

Almost simultaneously, the FAC aircraft fly-by came overhead. One OV-10 was followed by a four ship of 0-1s, with the lead aircraft emitting a trail of smoke.

Ghost Pilot Presentation. A buffet lunch at the Soundside immediately followed the Remembrance Service. There was no program, but Covey FAC **Evan Quiros** presented a copy of his bronze Ghost Pilot statue to the AFSOC Commander, **Lt Gen Michael Conley**. The Ghost Pilot symbolizes our brethren who were lost in Southeast Asia.

Business meeting and FINAL Banquet. An afternoon business meeting was held at the hotel and the final FAC Banquet happy hour began at 6 PM. **Brad Wright** served as the banquet's Master of ceremony which was of epic proportion. Brad thanked the entire



board of Directors and staff members for their faithful service and presented them with a plaque.

Darrel Whitcomb then gave a concise summary of the Southeast Asia War and the futility of our efforts to win the war due to our government not allowing us to put troops on the ground to permanently shut down the Ho Chi Minh Trail. Lesson Learned -- Airpower alone can't get the job done without boots on the ground.

The evening concluded with each past association president recapping their tenure as president. Brad Wright then closed the banquet thanking those who helped make this reunion such a big success.
